Jeremy's campaign to clean up our local rivers, especially the River Wey catchment, received a major boost following a commitment by Thames Water to invest over £423.7m in the next 3 years on priority areas including reducing phosphorous in Cranleigh, Elstead, Godalming, Shamley Green, Farnham and Haslemere.

Following a public meeting in Bramley that Jeremy organised with Thames Water's former CEO and Environment Agency (EA) Chair Alan Lovell, Thames Water published the commitment which Jeremy will now make sure they deliver.

At the same time, Chancellor Jeremy announced that all fines paid by water companies will be

spent on cleaning up sewage.
Since 2015 the EA has concluded
56 prosecutions against water
and sewage companies, securing
fines of over £141m, so it is right
that this money is channelled
back into improving water quality.

This comes on top of a new government requirement for water companies to invest £56bn over the next 25 years -the largest ever environmental infrastructure investment. Fines for water companies will be

unlimited and support for farmers to reduce slurry pollution will also be doubled and - in a victory for Jeremy's green spaces campaign - the plastic wet wipes which block sewers will be banned.
